We saw some fantastic individual and team performances from our athletes at the North Munster Schools Competition last week. A staggering 600 students from schools across North Kerry, Clare, Limerick, and Tipperary took part in the competition.

St Caimin's are coached by Ms. Quinn and Mr. Hennessy and the students who represented St. Caimin's were; Molly Moroney, Calvin McGuinness, Gloria Markham,



Aine Dennis, Hannah Nunes, Kelly Barker, Grainne McMahon, Molly Toomey, and Eabha Collins. After a quick warmup and an inspection of the conditions on the field, Molly Moroney took part in the first race of the day which was the Minor Girls competition. The first year student had a great start and kept a brilliant pace throughout the whole race to finish in 12th place and earned herself a qualification for Munster.

Next, Calvin McGuinness took to the field for the Junior Boys competition, finishing 22nd out of a field of 96 athletes. Gloria, Áine, Hannah, and Kelly then participated in the Intermediate Girls race and had a brilliant run, finishing in 18th, 20th, 21st and 31st place respectively. The Caimin's girls finished 4th overall as a team, which qualifies them for the Munster's. In the Senior Girls competition, 5th Year student Gráinne McMahon finished in 6th place, while Molly Toomey and Eabha Collins crossed the line in 8th and 9th place respectively, earning a silver medal for Caimin's. Public Access to Law By Sinéad Burke

Over the last number of weeks, Transition Years have been completing a Public Access To Law (PAL) course, facilitated by various professionals from the industry. This week, Transition Year Class A participated in the course, delivered by Barrister Marty Dwane.

The Public Access To Law programme, now in its 20th year, has become one of the most successful initiatives in Irish Education. The aim of the programme is to demystify the world of law and to embody many of the principles of Transition Year, including thinking on your feet, research, presentation skills and teamwork. The programme is designed especially for TY students, to give them an insight into law, as seen through the eyes of a practicing barrister or solicitor.

The programme facilitator Mr. Dwane offered students an invaluable insight into the world of law, covering the concept of justice, rules and etiquette and traditions of the Bar, the courts of Ireland, the Judiciary, and Jury Service. He also provided an insight into life as a practising barrister, how to qualify as a solicitor, and shared some of his experiences in court.

Students then had an opportunity to participate in a mock trial which was an intriguing and insightful experience. During this exercise, students were assigned a different role; solicitor, witness, victim, barrister, judge, just as you would see in court every day. Through this mock trial, students got a real feel for what it is like to be in court and experience a real trial and real cases. Mr. Dwane explained that there is a lot of work involved in the process of becoming a qualified barrister or solicitor. Marty Dwane told students that while he thoroughly enjoys his job and finds it to be extremely rewarding work, it is a career that involves a lot of hard work and commitment.

I spoke to one of the students who attended the course, to hear what he had to say about it. Transition



Transition Year student, Callum Sutton spoke highly about the day and believes it is something that all students should learn about and experience for themselves. Here is more of what he had to say:

"In our law course, we are currently doing a trial case like in an actual court with judges and witnesses and there are defendants too. This tests our abilities of the law and if they were in a real court. We listened to all the details of the law which was very interesting to learn about."

When I asked Callum whether he would consider a carers in law, he said, "To be honest, it probably isn't something I am interested in, but after today I might like to look further into that side of things."

He remarked, "It was a really good talk and I enjoyed getting the experience of hearing what Marty's career is like being a real barrister which is not something you get to experience every day." Speaking more about the mock trial, Callum added, "Doing the trial was really fun and good to know what it's like in a court when you must act as the defendant or another role in the courthouse. I played as the defendant council, helping the person being accused in this situation. In total, there were four witnesses, a register, a judge, and a jury. I liked the total experience so far of getting this talk on law and being a barrister. It is a really good especially if you would like to be a solicitor or something like that in the future." St Caimin's participated in a first year Rugby blitz on the 25th of January. This Rugby blitz took place in UL in Limerick. This marked the first of three blitzes the team will participate in as part of a Munster Development Cup.

The home team played four matches on the day and a trojan effort was put in by all players. They took on Pallaskenry in their first match which kicked off at 11am, then before their second match, they got to take a picture with the URC trophy. In their second match, they faced Thomond, in their third match they faced Scoil Pól, and their fourth game saw them face Villiers. The Caimin's team is managed by Mr. Nolan and Mr. McDermott and the captain for the day was Patrick Burke. The matches were played 11 a side, with 5 forwards and 6 backs and each game was 15 minutes long.

It wasn't long before Caimin's grabbed a second try, after beautiful passing from Caimin's to the wing, finished off nicely by Óisin Rafferty, who sprinted to the try line. After a nice bit of pressure from the Limerick side, Caimin's stole the ball and Daniel Meehan sprinted the whole way from the Caimin's try line to the Pallaskenry try line to finish with a 3-0 win. It was a great start for the Caimin's team.

In their second match against Thomond, the opposition took an early advantage. After many phases from Thomond, they broke the line and got their first try. However, it didn't take long for Camin's to get the equaliser after Daniel Meehan ran through the Thomond team. Thomond reclaimed the lead after a couple of missed tackles from Caimin's which led to a try, but again, Caimin's responded with gusto to achieve the equaliser, after a break from Óisin Rafferty. Then, in a turn of bad luck, Caimin's' star man Rory Jones got injured and couldn't play the rest of the blitz. Thomond got two late try's to win the game with a final score of 4-2 to Thomond.



In their third test match of the day, Caimin's lost to Scoil Pól from Kilfinane, Co. Limerick, despite their best efforts and a fantastic try from Jamie Moloney.

In the fourth and final match of the day, we took on Villiers and Caimin's took the lead very early on in the game, thanks to a fantastic play of rugby and Óisin Rafftery finished off a beautiful play from Caimin's. However, it did not take long for Villiers to claim their equaliser, after a missed tackle from Caimin's. Villiers again took the lead with fast passing and finishing of at the wing but then moments before the match finished Camin's got a late try to draw against the Limerick side, in a tantalising game of rugby. William secured a job in Ballycar National School, where he had multiple tasks to keep on top of throughout the day, such as *"helping* various students with class work, yard monitoring and using the photocopier and printer." He has learned a

lot from the experience, which has given him a different perspective on the day to day runnings of school.

When I asked him about the skills gained from this work experience, William responded, *"I have learned new technological skills using the photocopier and printer. Yard monitoring helps me with multitasking as I have to look after multiple people at once. I enjoyed my time there and learned a lot from the people I got to work with too."*

That is only one example of the type of experience our students are getting this week. There is a huge variety of jobs that I have heard about today from other LC1 students I have spoken to, ranging from working in a primary school, to an engineering company. I think this is a good week for the students. Having the opportunity to do work experience while in school helps build a sense of what it's like in the working world, and may even help students to discover possible career paths for the future. There is a similar initiative with TY students who do work experience every Friday throughout the school year. It's good that they are starting to do this sort of stuff now because it helps teenagers slowly transition into adulthood.
