Supporting yourchild and their learning

<u>Learning 2 Learn Resources:</u> Learning to Learn aims to strike a balance between the development of subject knowledge, thinking abilities and key skills enabling students to develop a number of essential learning habits such as:

- Checking and Reflecting (making links, setting targets, question and extend learning)
- Framing Learning (identify learning and make connections)
 Collaboration (Give and receive help, listen actively, express opinions and be a leader)
- Problem Solving (spot patterns, take notes and research)

Homework

In terms of Homework we expect that there is a genuine attempt made by the student to complete the homework to the best of his/her ability and to submit the work at an agreed time.

Homework is a very important part of learning. It helps us

- build on what we have learned in class
- practice skills
- ensure we understand new topics/concepts
- prepare for the next class

The Homework Journal:

Is the place where all homework is recorded. Homework is recorded at the end of each class and students have been reminded that there are many different types of homework. Parents and guardians should ensure that the student completes all homework to the best of his/her ability and should sign the students journal each week.

First year students should be completing approximately 1.5 hours of homework a night.

If there is a problem completing homework parents/guardians should inform the teacher of any difficulties by means of a written note in the journal.

There is no such thing as no homework - students are encouraged to revise what they would have covered in class that day. The topics/concepts covered in class should be written into the journal as a reminder.

Results System for Junior Cycle

The new junior cycle will place the student at the centre of the learning process. It allows for new ways of learning and a broader range of skills to be properly assessed. The table on the right aims to inform parents of post-primary school students and their parents about the key changes underway. For most parents, the grading system within the new junior cycle has been a big change. We were all so used to the grades A, B, C, D ect- these have been replaced with 'Grade Descriptors' and we have outlined what this change means.

Junior Cycle	
Percentage	Grade Descriptor
≥ 90 to 100	Distinction
≥ 75 and < 90	Higher Merit
≥ 55 and < 75	Merit
≥ 40 and < 55	Achieved
≥ 20 and < 40	Partially Achieved
≥ 0 and < 20	Not Graded (NG)

VS Ware

Close communication between home and school have been proven time and again to be a vital ingredient for the academic success of Junior Cycle students. VS Ware is a vital aspect of our communication network as parents are able to access student timetables, behavioural records, attendance and detention notifications in real time.



Top tips when using VS Ware:

- Make sure the date settings are fixed for 2022/23
- Do not give your child your access code for VS Ware under any circumstances.
- Always record any partial or full absences on VS Ware so the school has a full record of student activities.

After School Study

As a third-year student, your child should be spending up to two hours on homework/study each day after school. A growth mindset is what we are trying to encourage in the pupils with a gradual improvement over time.

For some, after school study is an excellent opportunity to complete the two hours homework in a structured and supervised environment. All details of the after-school study programme and an application form can be found on the school website.
