Throughout last week, we celebrated 'Stand Up Awareness Week' in school, culminating in our annual Colours Day at the end of the week. In recognition of the rainbow theme and of diversity in our school, each year group was designated a specific colour to wear on the day. A huge effort was made by students and staff alike, who wore their colours with pride as a show of solidarity and respect to everyone in the school community.

Stand Up Awareness Week takes place nationwide every year and the idea of this week is to give secondary schools all across the country time to take a stand against homophobic, biphobic and transphobic bullying. It is an opportunity for schools to take steps towards making secondary school a safe and supportive space for LGBTQ+ young people.

Every year, there is a theme for Stand Up Week, and this year was no different. The theme this year was 'Allyship' which was interesting to learn about from a student's point of view. We were informed that an ally is not just someone who is tolerant of LGBTQ+ people, or even someone who doesn't discriminate against them. Instead, an ally is someone who takes action to challenge prejudice, bullying, someone who tries to make the world a fairer and more equal place for all of us to live in.

Many students and staff worked together collaboratively to plan and organise this year's Stand Up Week and there were lots of activities happening throughout the week. There was also an opportunity for students and staff to donate €2, with all proceeds going to two deserving organisations GOSHH and Belong To.

GOSHH is a Limerick based charity which provides a safe, confidential, welcoming environment for everyone they work with, with a strong focus on promoting equality and



wellbeing, with a positive and respectful approach to gender diversity. Belong To is Ireland's national LGBTQ+ youth organisation that aims to create safe spaces and places for LGBTQ+ young people, and to empower others through education to support LGBTQ+ young people.

This year, St. Caimin's is working towards becoming an LGBTQ+ Quality Mark School which is very exciting. There will be lots of initiatives and events going on in the coming weeks and months to make our school a safer and more supportive place for all students.

We have an LGBTQ+ and Allies Group in St. Caimin's that is a safe, non-judgemental space for people to chat over lunches. You are welcome to come and join the group to learn more about the experiences of others. You don't have to identify with LGBTQ+ to attend and take part in LGBTQ+ school initiatives.

This year's Stand Up Awareness Week was a great success with students and staff all coming together in the spirit of community to embrace the occasion. We will keep you up to date with future LGBTQ+ events taking place throughout the year, along with an update on how much money was raised for Belong To and GOSHH, as soon as we have it.

On Wednesday the 15th of November, the St. Caimin's Senior Boys hurling team played Presentation Secondary School Ballingarry in a do or die match, which took place on the Seán Treacy GAA grounds in Kilcommon.

Our captain Calum Phelan won the toss and decided to play with a strong wind in the first half. Presentation Ballingarry started the match strong with four quick scores to put them ahead early on. St. Caimin's replied well with three frees by Seán Murphy and a one in a million score by Lee Freeman to level the sides. St. Caimin's managed to take the lead with Calum Phelan and Evan Crimmins scoring from long distances, while defenders Tadhg Fitzgerald and Mark Mullins kept their side in the game. St. Caimin's found it tough to get the chances they needed, hitting eight wides in the first half and Ballingarry keeping the game tight. The opposition side eventually found a way through St. Caimin's near the end of the first half and got three great scores to end the first half with a score of 0-9 to 0-6 favouring the Tipperary side.

St. Caimin's made a tactical change, bringing on Peter Gilligan for Lee Freeman at halftime, with Peter Gilligan have a huge impact on the game. Midfielders Jack O' Halloran and Niall Fitzgerald put in savage work to win almost every ball back in the middle of the pitch and supplying both wing forwards Eanna Collins and Chris Meaney. Wearing number 15 for Caimin's, Seán Murphy managed to find his momentum early in the second half and slot over four frees in a row, followed by another



Calum Phelan point. At this stage in the game, St. Caimin's decided take make their second and final change in the game and bring Neil Forde onto the wing in place of Chris Meaney. Our Keeper Ben Mulvihill continued to supply corner back Harry Chaplin and Dara McInerney with the ball and make some top class saves.

Full back John Deasy defended consistently to keep a very good full forward quiet for the game. With about fifteen minutes to go, Ballingarry broke the line and got in for a goal putting them 5 points clear of us. Soon after, a great ball into Finn Murphy was fired into the net putting us just two points behind with minutes remaining. Unfortunately, the goal wasn't enough for the lads to win and now they are knocked out of the championship. A great performance was put in by all players, with the score finishing 1-14 to 1-11 to Ballingarry. A narrow win and a hard fought battle for our home side. Hard luck to the Caimin's Boys on a narrow defeat to a very strong side.

Recently, I was part of a group of students who enjoyed a trip to Munich, Germany. When we arrived in Munich on day one, we visited Marienplatz, a gorgeous central square in the heart of the city. It is a bustling and vibrant place, known for its historical and architectural significance. The square is surrounded by impressive buildings, including the New Town Hall. After exploring the square, we visited the Allianz Arena. Here, we enjoyed a brilliant, guided tour experience and got to shout "GOAL" from the seats, which echoed throughout the stadium. While there, we got to see the Bayern München dressing rooms and take a walk onto their perfectly kept pitch.



We returned to Marienplatz for a guided tour of the city which included a visit to a Michael Jackson memorial, followed by dinner at The Hard Rock Café. The day wasn't finished just yet as we arrived at 3D Neon-Minigolf, where the vibrant colours and glowing designs made for an exciting evening activity to end our first day in Munich.

The next morning, we dressed up warm as we were headed for Mount Zugspitze. At 2,962 metres above sea level, it is the highest mountain in Germany. We all crammed into a cable car which took us to the peak of the mountain, which was chilly to say the least! Despite the cold, my friends and I headed straight for the glaciers down another cable car, where we got to go sledging down a slope. This was a barrel of laughs when no one could stand still on the ice. We flew down the bumpy slope before crashing into the snow at the bottom and climbing back up the hill with the sled in tow. This was definitely the highlight of the entire trip for most people. The laughs we had are memories we will never forget!

While in Munich, we enjoyed some of the local cuisine. We tried 'Currywurst mit Pommes', a German dish of a pork sausage, ketchup curry and fries. Most found it to be a delicious and unique combination of flavours that left us craving more. Once we returned to Marienplatz we had a bit of free time to explore and shop until it was time for dinner at 'La Forchetta'. Our evening activity was a round of bowling to end the day on a high note. On our final day, we visited the BMW museum, which displays a collection of BMW cars, motorcycles, and showcases the brand's history, engines, and innovations, and technology. This proved to be a delightful and stunning experience. Following that, we proceeded to Dachau, a memorial for one of the first concentration camps set up in Germany in March 1933. Visiting the memorial was a real eye opener, it is a solemn place with a museum and preserved parts of the former camp, like the barracks and a crematorium. Visiting this memorial helps us learn about history and honour the memory of those who suffered there. It was definitely worth seeing. This concluded our Leaving Cert trip to Munich.

Overall, this adventure was fantastic and filled with excitement, particularly because it was the sole chance for an overseas school trip for the majority of us. We created numerous unforgettable memories and forged new friendships with individuals we hadn't previously had the chance to connect with. Exploring the Wonders of Rome – A Trip to Remember

The adventure began as students and teachers landed at Naples Airport, filled with excitement and anticipation for the cultural experience awaiting them. For students, it was a haunting yet captivating testament to early Christian burial practices.

Overall, students and staff had a brilliant time in Rome. From ancient ruins to modern marvels, from art to history, the trip proved to be an enriching experience that transcended textbooks, leaving students with an appreciation for the cultural diversity of this famous city. The group bid 'Arrivederci' to Rome as they made their way to Fiumicino Airport, cherishing the memories of an unforgettable journey that will undoubtedly be a highlight of their time in St. Caimin's for many years to come.
