

On Tuesday the 8th of April, TY students were brought on a trip to Padel LK in Ballysimon, Limerick, where students were taught how to play Padel.

The day started with the instructor explaining what padel was. Padel is a racket sport that is very similar to tennis and squash, however it's played indoors. It has become one of the largest growing sports to date!.

The main rules were the following: When serving you have to bounce it from the hip and no higher, when serving the ball must bounce within the box diagonally across from them, each time the ball is hit it must bounce once before hitting it like tennis.

In Padel LK, each court was enclosed within a glass box. The box could be used while playing as you are allowed to hit it against the wall over the net instead of just hitting it with the racket.

Everyone was put into pairs and were given a while to practice playing and get used to the game before the final event: the tournament Each team played head-to-head with other teams for one ultimate victor to be crowned.

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SUSTAINABILTY TOUR OF DROMOLAND CASTLE By Lily Egan

On Wednesday the 9th of April, a select few of our TY students travelled to Dromoland, Newmarket where they would be given a tour of Dromoland while being brought through the measures they're taking to become more sustainable.

We first were greeted by our guide who would be taking us through the tour. She started off by talking to us about the types of trees and plants on the property as well as how the damages caused by Storm Éowyn this January has affected them. She also talked us through the vast amount of biodiversity the area has.

She also talked to us about the beehives there. Not only do these bees pollinate their lush landscape and countless trees and plants, but they make honey that the hotel uses! We continued on our walking tour where we saw sights such as a lily pond dating back to as early as 1705, a hermit's grotto, and a temple built to commemorate a horse a man bet the entire property on, the horse is buried beneath the temple.

We then saw Dromoland castle and were brought to see the vast lake. Most of their irrigation systems come from this lake.



Next, we were brought to the most interesting part of the tour, the composter. The staff were given this huge composting machine where they dispose of their food waste to turn into their own compost. Not only does this save them buying in compost, but it finds a good use for food waste and puts it back into the gardens. They also have a very strict bin system where the bins are checked to make sure everything is in the right bin. As well as this, any money made from cans from the hotel via the Re-Turn scheme goes back to charities.

We were then brought through their beautiful walled garden and their other gardens where we saw how they make more compost using shredded paper.

Finally, we were brought inside for hot chocolate and pastries as we did a quiz on how long it takes certain items to decompose.

Overall, the trip was very interesting and the students learned a lot from this tour.
